You're also warmly invited to explore Scotland's heritage online at historicenvironment.scot/Learn or in person at one of our 300+ historic sites across Scotland.

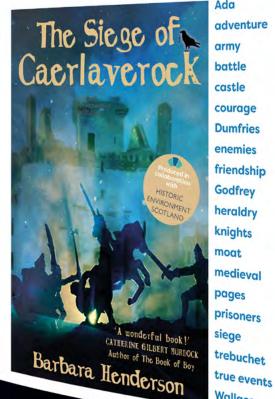

Infer What's Not There

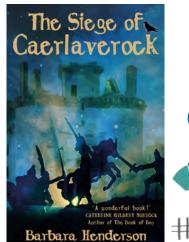
Ch3: At the end of this chapter, the text says: 'The Commander is up to no good, of that I am sure'.

Read and Understand

Ch4: Ada is stressed in the second half of this chapter. Find three clues in the text which back up this claim.

Add them to your drawing of Ada.

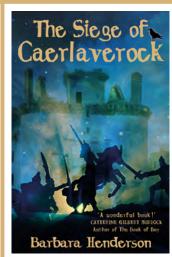
Are you enjoying the story? Discuss in your group what you like and dislike about *The Siege of Caerlaverock* so far.

Create Something Great

Include Dumfries, Carlisle, Berwick, the Solway Firth, Caerlaverock, Glencaple and Whithorn. Add any other places of interest if you like. Use an atlas or the internet to help you. (Tracing paper may come in handy!)

Look at the title of this chapter. What does 'coveting' mean?

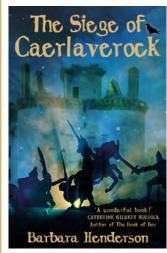
Make an educated guess, then check your answer using a dictionary. Write down the definition.

Ch10:

On p60, Fa scolds: 'Don't be idle, Ada!' Is this fair? Why/why not? Do your parents/carer tell you off? Is it sometimes fair?

Connect 4

In Chapter 11, Ada and Godfrey are faced with a medical emergency. Have you ever faced an emergency or witnessed one? What did you do?

Do you know what to do in an emergency? Discuss in your group.



Make a list of the emergency services that you know about and how to contact them.

Infer What's Not There

Ch12:

'Colban Graham clearly used his time well.' (p74)

Make a list of the things Colban Graham has done while Ada was gone.

Infer What's Not There

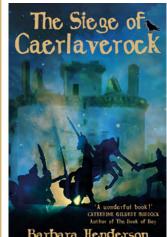

Reflect and Respond

Chapters 13-16





Infer What's Not There

Ch14: 'Dead perhaps? My soul stirs a little at that, however much I despise him.' (p87) Explain fully, in your own words, what this means.

Ch15: 'How my heart dances at that.' (p97) Why is Ada so relieved that the vase is unbroken? What would be the consequence of it breaking?

Connect 4

'It is said to contain the most precious of relics, a bone from St Andrew himself.' (p87)

Saints and relics are very important in the Middle Ages. (Is there a saint of your name? What are they famous for?)



What do people hope will bring them luck or protection today? Do you believe in these things?

Explore Some More

Ch16: Make a list of at least three key words which are repeated on p100. Why do you think the author chose to repeat them?

Chapter headings are tricky to write! The author has to give a flavour of what happens without giving everything away. Which chapter heading in the book is most effective so far, in your opinion? Write your own chapter headings for this week's chapters.

Infer What's Not There

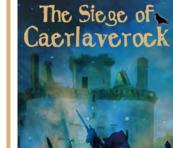
Ch17: On page 109, Ada uses a lot of *rhetorical questions*—the kind of questions she does not expect anyone to answer.

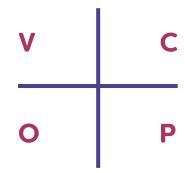
Connect 4

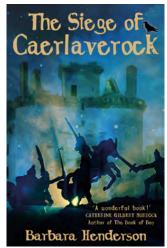
Infer What's Not There

Reflect and Respond

Ch22: 'I too sink down on my knees—a castle in submission.' (p135)

How do you feel about this? Are you glad they surrender, or would you have hoped for a different ending?

Does Ch22 p.138 surprise you? Why? Does the chapter ending make you keen to find out what happens next?

Connect 4

Ada's fate and that of everyone at Caerlaverock depends on the King. We still have a *monarchy* in this country.

Do you think this is outdated?
Discuss your ideas and find out five arguments for having a monarchy and five against.

- On the last two pages of the novel there is a little *repetition*. Which words are repeated and why do you think the author chooses to repeat them? What effect does it have?

Discuss in your group and make a list of the main things this book has taught you.

Do you prefer *fiction* or *non-fiction*? Explain your answer.





Chapters 25-26





Infer What's Not There

Ch25/26: Think about the Friar. Based on what you know about him, answer the following questions as if you were in his shoes—you might need to use your imagination:

Did you grow up in a poor family? Have you had other dogs before Nosewise? What part of your job do you like and dislike? If you could pray one prayer which would definitely be answered, what would it be?

Connect 4

'The world is not as I would have it, Ada, that much is true. But there are blessings, too.

Blessings which may never have come to us without the hardships.' (Ch26, p157)

In what way is our world not 'as we would have it'? What would you change? Can you see good things in amongst the difficulties?
